Religion and Education in Morocco and Tunisia

Ken Carpenter traveled for approximately two months in Algeria, Tunisia, and Morocco this summer as part of two separate programs. The first was sponsored by the U.S. Department of State for the purpose of promoting more international exchange program between the U.S. and the region. The second was a Fulbright-Hayes Summer Seminar on Religious Diversity in Morocco and Tunisia. Ken will describe what he learned about religious and political dynamics in Morocco and Tunisia, and discuss the need and potential for more educational and cultural exchanges with countries in North Africa.
